Absentees

Students are expected to attend and be punctual to all classes and events. School starts at 8.45am each day with Learning Mentor (LM).

 If a student is absent, it is important that parents/guardians inform the school by 9am on the day, *providing a reason.*

- All absentees are recorded at morning LM. If the College has not been notified of a student's absence, both parents or guardians or custodial parents will be notified by text message to let them know that their child is not at school.
 The reason for the absence will be requested as it is a legal requirement that the College notes this on the absence register.
- If a reply is not received from the students' parents, the office will ring parents contact number. If a reply is still not recived emergency contacts will be notified
- Attendance is taken at the start of each period.
- Parents are not required to notify the office if students are attending excursions and sports carnivals as excursions and sports carnivals are part of the school's planned learning activities.

If a student is late

- Students arriving late are required to sign-in at Student Reception.
- A note or telephone message from parents/guardians is required to support the reason for the lateness if signing in more than 15 minutes late

Covid-19

There has been an increase in the number of COVID19 cases across North East Victoria in recent weeks.

So just a few reminders about some actions that we can all take to keep our community safe.

• Air purifiers can be used and windows and doors opened to provide ventilation.

• Students can also be given the opportunity to work outside when appropriate.

 Good hand, cough and sneeze hygiene continues to be important, as does physical distancing where possible.

• Students who are confirmed cases should isolate at home for at least 5 days and only return to school when they are well.

We have a number of staff and students with vulnerable health. Staying at home if you are unwell will help protect all members of the College community.

• Anyone who is a close contact of a confirmed case is encouraged to wear a mask. Masks are available from reception for those who would like them.

• RATs are also available at reception for testing if you develop symptoms and for daily testing of close contacts.

• We continue to ask parents and carers to report positive cases to the School.

As always, if you are unwell, please do not come to school until your symptoms resolve.

Some reminders when dealing with mental health problems and events that are going on in the world with your young people:

- There is a lot of random chaos in the universe and bad things do happen, so focus on the good parts and if you can't change something, change the way you think about it!
- Set clear boundaries with young people - this includes phone use!
 E.g no phones at bedtime or when studying.
- Use humour when you can and only argue over things that matter.

At Michael Carr Gregg's Mental Health Seminar, discussed in the last newsletter, he finished with a popular quote 'Young people are 20% of the population and 100% of the future, and the future is in your hands'

If you are concerned about your child's mental wellbeing or have noticed signs of anxiety or depression, or other behaviours not normal for your child, it is best to take them to your GP for further assessment and investigation.

If you need assistance at school, don't hesitate to get in touch with their Learning Mentor, your first point of contact.

Year 11 City Experience

Year 11's Explore Melbourne's Past, Present and Future.

Our Year 11 students returned from an action-packed 3-day camp to Melbourne last week, having experienced some of the city's top attractions and opportunities.

The camp kicked off by stepping back in time with a tour of the historic Old Melbourne Gaol. Students got a harsh glimpse into prison life in the 1800s as they saw the cramped cells and grounds where many of Melbourne's most notorious criminals were once held.

A feature of the three days was taking in the acclaimed musical "Wicked" at the Regent Theatre. The spellbinding production dazzled with its imaginative sets, show-stopping songs, and powerful story about friendship and being true to yourself.

Another highlight was the Arts Centre Melbourne with a visit to The Australian Music Vault. The Australian Music Vault features an immersive exhibition showcasing the evolution of Australian music, innovative digital experiences, and iconic objects from our Australian Performing Arts Collection.

A visit to the annual VCE and Careers Expo combined with a tour of Melbourne University was all about looking towards future career paths. Our students had the chance to meet with representatives from a variety of industries, universities, and training providers. They gathered valuable information about further study options and employment outlooks across dozens of professions.

The 'Amazing Melbourne Race' saw students race around the city centre in teams, tackling brain-teasers and

destination challenges at locations like Victorian Library, Shrine of Remembrance, Flinders Street Station, and State Parliament. It was a fun team-building activity that tested their navigational and problem-solving abilities.

Between the cultural sites, dazzling theatrical performance, careers planning, and Amazing Race excitement, Year 11s hopefully walked away having gained new perspectives and insights into both Melbourne's storied past and their own futures ahead. It was an educational and bonding experience they hopefully won't soon forget!

Sincere thanks goes out to the Year 11s for their exceptional behaviour and enthusiasm throughout the camp. The students were incredibly respectful, engaged, and collaborative during each activity and proved fine ambassadors for Marian College and the wider Myrtleford community. G.R.O.W Up! Production



Careers Update

What is an ARTS degree or BA? Do I have to study Art?

You don't have to study art, but you may choose to. The arts or humanities include subjects like philosophy, history, English and other languages, visual arts, performing arts, media and communications and religion. The social sciences include economics, politics and international relations, archaeology, anthropology, sociology, criminology, linguistics, law etc. (Source: University of Sydney)

Almost all universities will offer a Bachelor of Arts degree. Some examples include:

Career Profile – Hairdresser

Hairdressers cut, style, colour, straighten and permanently wave hair and provide clients with hair and scalp treatments.

To become a hairdresser you usually have to complete an apprenticeship. Entry requirements may vary, but employers generally require Year 10. You can also become a hairdresser by completing a VET qualification.



I know young people are engaged with issues they care about right across Indi. The Parliament Volunteer Program offers an exciting opportunity where you can share your expertise and experiences with me and my team in Canberra and see first-hand how the parliament works.

No experience or prior knowledge about the parliament is needed to participate in this program. The only requirements are an enthusiastic learning attitude and a passion to contribute to positive change for your communities. My team will support you with any skills you need to make your time in Canberra meaningful and fun.

Your role can involve attending meetings and events, researching and writing, watching Question Time in action, meeting people from across the nation and touring Parliament House and the Parliamentary Library. You will get the opportunity to engage and positively contribute to issues that matter to you.

The program is open to individuals aged 18 years and older that live or work in Indi or are from Indi but have moved away for further study.

The program runs from Monday to Thursday, a full sitting week. Participants are required to cover their own costs of participation; however, homestay options are available. Volunteers between the ages of 18–30 may apply for a bursary to assist with travel expenses. This is allocated on a first-come, first-served basis until the funds are exhausted.

Places for the 2024 Parliament Volunteer Program are expected to fill up quickly. If you are interested in taking part, please fill out the <u>Expression of Interest Form</u> to secure a place.
